## Day 2 – Prague Sunday


Miluska and Radka took us on a tour through Prague, which was kind of exhausting after a while, trying to keep 40 people together. We managed it fairly well, though.

**We had an official welcome by the headmaster and the students of the gymnasium and the nurse school.**





The project work was at the beginning very confusing with respect to allocating all students to a group.

Furthermore, students had a hard time to communicate and to overcome language barriers. At the end it worked out fine and everybody was working hard on the project. In the evening we were invited by a Czech teacher for a barbecue in his place. We made a campfire and one of the Czech colleagues, Ludvig Schmidt, and one of his friends played songs on the guitar and violin the whole evening, with us singing to it, more or less well.

## Day 5 – Vsetin Wednesday

In the morning the students had the opportunity to shortly visit Luhačovice Spa, **where mineral water is analysed.**





After that we visit the Comenius Museum in Uherský Brod in Southern Moravia.



In the afternoon Ms Wandelt went with some Czech, Turkish, Italian and German students to a local ice hockey game. Vsetin plays in the second league. We had so much fun. The atmosphere was awesome, singing, shouting and waving flags, just like games in Germany. For the Italian and Turkish students watching an ice hockey game was a totally new experience.

## **Day 6 – Vsetin Thursday**

In the morning the project work was continued in Masarykovo Gymnázium. All groups worked on their presentations and their posters, which turned out really well. Students were able to work in the school's art gallery or IT room and could let their creativity flow. Before lunch, we were all invited to a meeting with the mayor of Vsetin in the town hall. The mayor welcomed the exchange partners and informed them about Vsetin and its history.




